McKinney bond election results

Six propositions passed on ballot worth \$51.35 million

McKINNEY, TEXAS (May 8, 2010) – Today McKinney residents passed all six City Bond Propositions according to the unofficial election results from the Collin County Election Administrator.

Provisional ballots will be counted and final results certified next week.

Proposition number 1 passed 1769 to 687. Proposition 1 called for the issuance of \$12.5 million general obligation bonds for park and recreational facilities, including land acquisition, construction, improvements and expansion.

Proposition number 2 passed 1816 to 593. Proposition 2 called for the issuance of \$11.35 million general obligation bonds for park public safety facilities, including land acquisition, construction and improvements.

Proposition number 3 passed 1950 to 478. Proposition 3 called for the issuance of \$15.5 million general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing and improving streets and associated drainage improvements within the city, including sidewalks and railroad crossings, traffic control and signalization devices, street lighting, public streetscaping and landscaping improvements, curb and gutter replacements and related improvements.

Proposition number 4 passed 1739 to 652. Proposition 4 called for the issuance of \$5 million general obligation bonds for public works facilities improvements, construction and land acquisition.

Proposition number 5 passed 1728 to 642. Proposition 5 called for the issuance of \$4 million general obligation bonds for construction and improvement to flood control facilities including creeks, dams and lakes.

Proposition number 6 passed 1603 to 810. Proposition 6 called for the issuance of \$3 million general obligation bonds for connectivity and improvements of municipal parking facilities in the Historic Downtown area.
